# 2025 Indigenous Education Gathering Program Review

CASS Leadership Consultant Dr. Dianne Roulson and APLC Knowledge Carrier Jason Bigcharles shared updates to the Gathering program.

The theme **Wahkotamowin for Student Success** builds on last year's theme and emphasizes holistic relationships with everything in the natural world. The focus on strengthening relationships in education and aligning with the <u>principles of Truth and Reconciliation</u> is central to this year's Gathering in addition to renewing commitment to the <u>Truth and Reconciliation</u> Commission's Calls to Action.
